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Dear Brothers and Sisters,

It's that time of year again. In some areas the kids have been back to school for a couple weeks already, but it's never too late to talk about their safety. Most of us have school age children or grandchildren, so here's a little food for thought.

Back-to School Safety Checklist

Transportation Safety

Walking to school

Review some safety rules with your children.

Walk on the sidewalk, if one is available. When you must walk on a street with no sidewalk, walk facing the traffic.

Before you cross the street, stop and look all ways to see if cars are coming.

Never cross the street from between parked cars

Riding a bicycle to school

Make sure your children always wear a helmet.

Teach your children the rules of the road for bicycle riders.

Ride on the right side of the road and in single file.

Come to a complete stop before crossing the street.



Riding a school bus

If it's their first time riding the bus, go to the bus stop with your children to teach them proper way to get on and off the bus.

Make sure they know to stand six feet away from the curb until the bus comes to a complete stop.

If your children need to cross the street in front of the bus, walk on the side of the road until you are at least 10 feet in front of the bus. This isn't always possible, but they should always be able to see the bus driver, and the bus driver should always be able see them.

Please remember to drive defensively, and watch out for children's mistakes. Don't drive around school bus's picking up or dropping off children, it's dangerous and also against the law. Every school year there are incidents involving children on their way to or from school. Please help make this a safe school year for everyone.

Early voting begins 29 days before an election and ends on the day prior to Election Day. Most importantly, please be safe in the work while this process works itself out. It is appalling that management believes another week of ZERO percent (0%) incentive the Hot Strip received last week is what's deserving of the Hot Mill members who are working their butts off, without input, all while breaking shipping records. It is hard to believe that instead of working with the union to figure out the details of why a plan can pay ZERO, they are actually working among themselves to prove it's the memberships fault that it

did.....Brothers and Sisters, I challenge you to keep performing your jobs in the most professional manner. These are OUR mills and OUR customers that we must keep!!!! We will still be operating the 84" when the current management is long gone. Be safe and continue to support the process. Maybe they will recognize, one day, that the union members @ the 84" would like to be part of operating a successful Hot Mill and would help in that effort, if given the chance.

Dear Brothers and Sisters

MEMBERS RESPONSIBILITY

The above are two words that are found in the Program of Insurance Benefits book and the Summary Plan Description book. A day does not pass that Larry or I get a visit or phone call with an insurance problem. We can help fix insurance issues with the proper documentation, explanation of benefits form from the insurance and the actual bill from the health care provider, and some phone calls by the member. Often times a simple phone call to the respective insurance provider can clear up an insurance issue. Most insurance problems stem from when your health care provider doesn't send the proper documentation or delays sending the proper documentation to the insurance provider. So to save yourself some grief, make a call and find out what is going on with your claim. When making a call remember to write down the time, date, and the person that you speak with, that will help us fix your problem. Claims are time sensitive, a member has 180 days to appeal a claim. After 180 days your claim can become your responsibility. One of the easiest ways to track your claims is to log onto our respective providers websites and join as a member.

Brothers and Sisters,

There have been many questions arising on sickness and accident. So I would like to go over the process of filing for sickness and accident as well as eligibility and benefits you are entitled to.

Who should apply for S&A

- An employee who is or will be unable to work due to an illness or an injury (whether the injury happened at work or elsewhere), and a physician has certified your disability.
- Employees who are applying for Workers Comp, who are receiving Social Security old age or Social Security Disability should still apply for S&A.

How to apply for S&A

Call 1-888-596-7872 and ask for S&A or short term disability. This should be done as soon as possible. In cases such as planned surgery, it can be done ahead of time. Should be done within 21 days of the start of your disability to avoid processing complications.

When do my S&A benefits start

- On the (1st) first day of a disability as a result of an accident
- On the (1st) first day of inpatient or outpatient surgery
- On the (8th) eight day of an illness or an injury when not hospitalized

How much do I receive

- Amount of weeks that you are eligible for benefits depends on your length of service
- Weekly benefits are equal to 70% of your base rate of pay times 40 hours. You will receive a benefit for each day you are off.

Can I collect vacation while I'm off on S&A

Yes. You are eligible for full S&A and vacation pay during the same week.

What if my S&A benefits are denied or stopped

From time to time you and your doctor will be required to update your medical information to certify that you are still unable to return to work. If you and your doctor has sent in the appropriate information and your claim is still being denied, you should contact your Union representative and <u>file a grievance</u>. Also, you should file an appeal with Prudential to further protect your rights.

Other benefits that effect your S&A benefits

- S&A is offset by Workers' Comp. The amount of offset differs depending on how long you have been off. If your doctor returns you to work on "light duty" and the company does not return you to work with the restrictions, you will be paid full unreduced S&A and full Workers' Comp.
- S&A benefits are reduced by Social Security Disability
- If you receive Workers' Comp or a Social Security Award you may owe back pay for an overpayment of S&A. Check with your Union before spending any awards.

Complete information of your S&A benefits can be found in the Program of Insurance Benefits (SPD) beginning on page 13. Also I have heard complaints about prudential returning calls or losing information, if we do not get this information there is nothing that we can do to help you. So please inform us if they are not doing their job.

ber 15.

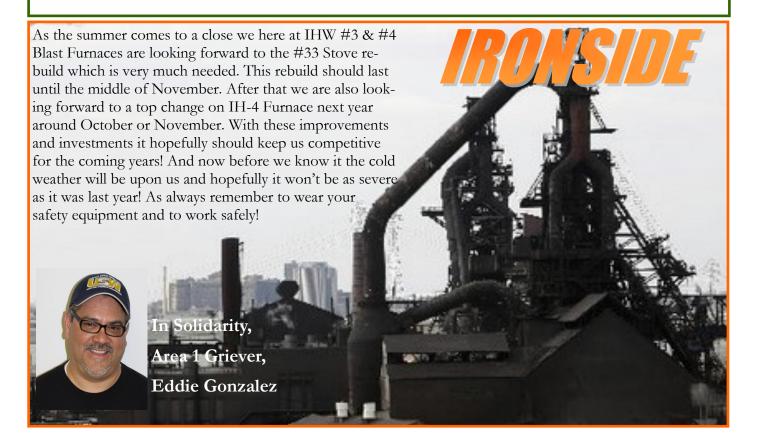
